Why They Are Here

Each year Pacific leatherback sea turtles journey 6,000 miles each way across the Pacific from nesting beaches on Indonesia to feeding grounds along the U.S. west coast. They feed on hundreds of jellyfish each day off the coast of California, Oregon, and Washington. Leatherback sea turtles are the largest, deepest diving sea turtle species and can grow to be over 6 feet long and weigh 2,000 lbs.

Why Leatherback Sea Turtles are Critically Endangered

Leatherbacks have existed on this planet for 100 million years, surviving the extinction of the dinosaurs. However, in the past 20 years leatherback populations have declined a drastic 95% in the Pacific Ocean. Leatherbacks are killed by pelagic longline fishing, drift gillnet fishing, ingestion of plastics thought to be jelly fish, and poaching of eggs and turtles. Leatherback conservation efforts led by the Sea Turtle Restoration Project have increased protection for these gentle giants.
