


## Steller Sea Lion Figures




**FIGURE 1**. The distribution of the Steller sea lion (*Eumetopias jubatus*). This species has two distinct populations separated at 144° W longitude. The western population is listed as endangered and the eastern population is listed as threatened under the Endangered Species Act (from NOAA-AFSC <a href="http://www.afsc.noaa.gov/Quarterly/Features/feature\_ifm96.pdf">http://www.afsc.noaa.gov/Quarterly/Features/feature\_ifm96.pdf</a>).
